STOP THIS INVADER! SPOTTED LANTERNFLY.

WHAT IS IT? The spotted lanternfly is an invasive insect from Asia currently found in southeastern Pennsylvania, and sightings have been reported in some neighboring states.

The pest threatens important agricultural commodities, including the grape, hardwood, tree fruit, landscape, and nursery industries –

sectors that contribute nearly \$18 billion annually to Pennsylvania's economy.

This planthopper weakens plants by feeding on sap. It excretes a sugary substance called honeydew, which attracts stinging insects, promotes the growth of sooty mold, and causes a messy nuisance for residents.

To help stop the spread of spotted lanternfly, the state has issued a quarantine order requiring the inspection of all items moving within or out of the area to prevent the transport of any living life stage of the pest.

KNOW WHAT TO LOOK FOF

Spotted lanternfly adults are about 1 inch long and half inch wide with wings folded. Nymphs are 1/8 to 1/2 inch long and develop through four stages, all of which are wingless.

Egg masses are gray, mud-like covering, which can become dry and cracked over time. Older egg masses may lose their covering and appear as columns of 30-50 seed-like eggs. Egg masses can be found on trees, rocks, and other surfaces.





Holiday Curbside Collection

Trash collection schedule runs Monday through Friday only. If the holiday is on your regular collection day, your trash and recyclables will be collected the following day. All other collections that week will follow the normal schedule. If the holiday is on Friday, the refuse will be collected on Saturday.

Yard Waste Bags Available for Purchase

Brown "Kraft" bags are available at the Recycle Center and the Public Works facility. These bags are to be used for yard waste and cleanup and placed at curbside for pickup by Waste Management.

(NOTE: Last pickup will occur the week of October 30th). Bags are sold in packs of 5 & are priced at \$ 4.00 plus tax.

Wood Waste Notice

As the fall cleanup of yards and gardens begin, residents are reminded that the wood waste pile at the Recycling Center is for woody materials only. Foreign objects such as trash bags, flowerpots, plant stakes and plastic planting materials will become part of the mulch pile after the woody materials have been put through the tub grinder. These materials are an unsightly addition to the mulch pile as well as a hazard to the grinding equipment and the operator.

2020 LEAF COLLECTION

As summer draws to an end, the Public Works Department prepares for the advent of our annual leaf collection. Leaf collection is scheduled to begin on Monday, October 5, 2020 and end on Friday December 4, 2020.

We ask that residents observe the following guidelines when placing leaves at the curb

- 1. No leaf collection will be made in alleys.
- 2. Do not place any foreign materials, such as rocks, toys, boards, tree trimmings, garden waste, flower stalks, etc. in leaves to be collected. If any such items are present, the leaf pile will not be collected. Foreign material in leaf piles can cause injuries to the workers and can damage the equipment.
- 3. Grass clippings will not be collected. You may take your grass clippings to the Recycling Center during operating hours.

The Public Works Department will make every effort to adhere to the schedule shown below. In the event of inclement weather, some delays may occur. In addition, the quantity of leaves will also determine whether it is possible for the Public Works Department to stay on schedule.

Please trim trees to a height of 12' above the cart way to allow clearance for the leaf trucks.

- · Completed work on Elm Avenue at Vault 6
- · Started work on Cherry Drive at the intersection of Sand Hill Road



- · Continued work on Elm Avenue from Vault 5 to Vault 4
- · Started work on Sand Hill Road North of Cherry Drive



- · Completed duct bank construction on Elm Avenue; began paving on Elm Avenue
- · Completed Sand Hill Road, North of Cherry Drive
- · Began pulling underground cable
- · Planning to start south side of Sand Hill near Forest Avenue and Rt. 322
- · Starting overhead work at substation



- · Continuing construction on Sand Hill Road toward Cherry Drive.
- · Continuing construction on Rt. 322
- · Continuing cable pulling operations
- · Continuing overhead work at substation

We plan to start removing the existing overhead line once the underground line is complete. Removal of poles on Forest Avenue may start in Dec. 2020, depending on schedule and weather. The rest of the line will be removed in 2021.

Pennsylvania Voter Registration Form - Register to Vote in PA

First time voters in Pennsylvania can submit the **Pennsylvania voter registration** form in order to register for upcoming elections. In addition to voter registration, the form can be used by previously registered voters for the purposes of updating personal information or changing political party affiliation. Pennsylvania residents may only register if they have been a US citizen for at least one (1) month prior to the election and if they will be at least eighteen (18) years old on the day of the election. After the form has been filled in, it can be hand delivered or sent by mail to a local County Voter Registration Office. The State has also provided an online service through which users may submit their forms.

THE HERSHEY'S HIGH POINT MANSION &

WHEN MILTON HERSHEY DECIDED TO MOVE HIS CHOCOLATE BUSINESS TO DERRY CHURCH, PA AND BUILD A TOWN THAT WOULD SUPPORT HIS WORKERS, HE AND CATHERINE (OR KITTY AS SHE WAS AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN), MADE PLANS TO BUILD A HOME.

The land for their new home was surveyed in 1903, shortly after ground was broken for the new factory. Mr. Hershey hired C. Emlen Urban, a noted Lancaster architect, to design their new home. Urban was also the architect for the new chocolate factory

and most of the other major buildings constructed during the early years of the community (visit https://hersheyarchives.org/ to learn more about Mr. Urban). A contract for the Hershey's mansion was signed in 1905 but construction was delayed until early 1906. The mansion was completed in 1908 and Milton and Catherine Hershey soon took up residence.

Their new home was named High Point, reflecting its location on a rise above the chocolate factory. High Point, while a gracious and comfortable home, was a relatively modest dwelling. The construction, furnishings, and landscaping of the Mansion cost about \$100,000. Total cost of the house itself, recorded in architect C. Emlen Urban's invoice, was \$53,433. Compared with the homes of other wealthy industrialists, the Mansion was modest both in size and appointments. It had few rooms (22), no bar, and no swimming pool. In comparison, George

Vanderbilt spent an estimated \$10 million for his 250-room mansion, Biltmore, situated on 125,000 acres in Asheville, North Carolina.

In designing High Point, Urban created an open design for the first floor, which was quite unique for the time period, but also maintained the traditional

2.5 story American Foursquare layout (four rooms on the first floor, and four on the second, along with a halfstory third floor). The open concept removed any walls and doors between the living room, dining room, library and the entry hall. The entry hall was specially designed to showcase a cut glass torchiere which Mr. Hershey had first

seen at the 1893 Columbian Exposition (the torchiere is currently on exhibit at The Hershey Story). Some of the furniture and much of the china had been bought by the Hershey's on their travels abroad or on shopping excursions to Philadelphia and New York. To decorate the Mansion, they were assisted by the Chapman Decorative Company of Philadelphia. While the Hershey's did hire professional decorators, they also enjoyed following their own tastes. Kitty saw to it that the rooms had plenty of color. The Blue Room and the Green Room were the upstairs guest rooms. Mr. Hershey's bedroom was the Gold Room. In Mrs. Hershey's room, both walls and carpet were rose pink. The living room had several glassed-in bookcases furnished with sets of standard authors. On winter evenings Milton Hershey used to sit there, looking into the fireplace, which was furnished with gas logs (a relatively new invention).

The staff at High Point was small: a housekeeper, a houseman, and a housemaid. The housekeeper was Mrs. Bertha Candoni, who began working for the Hershey's in Europe as a traveling companion and interpreter; she spoke seven languages. The houseman, Clayton Lehman, had been a gardener at the Homestead and became the majordomo at the Mansion. He looked after the lights, sent for the carpenter and plumber when they were needed,

cleaned the chandelier, walked the dog, and kept peace when possible between Mrs. Candoni and the housemaid (who changed twenty-two times in eleven years.)

The gardens were originally laid out by noted Philadelphia landscape architect, Olgesby Paul. Those plans were implemented and expanded by Harry Haverstick, head of the Hershey Nursery and Greenhouses. Kitty Hershey's greatest pleasure was in the garden. Behind the house was a small arbor by a flower-bordered pool into which a fountain tossed a jet of water. She used to sit there for hours, moving only when a gust of wind blew the spray over her. She tried to protect herself from this annoyance by moving the fountain. Jake Hummel moved it for her repeatedly, but nothing would do until the spray fountain was removed altogether and the Boy with the Leaking Boot (now at Hershey Gardens) replaced it.

It was in the gardens and the landscaping that Kitty Hershey made her greatest contribution to the town. Haverstick thought highly of Kitty Hershey's taste. "She was interested in the planting of trees and everything that made the properties look nice" recalled one of the gardeners.

Catherine Hershey died March 23, 1915 after a long illness. In about 1918 a memorial rose garden was planted at High Point. The rose garden was planted near the Country Club's future swimming pool. When the pool was constructed in 1954, the memorial rose garden was transplanted to Hershey Gardens.

During the years following her death, Milton Hershey spent long periods traveling. In 1930 he turned High Point over to the newly formed Hershey Country Club, retaining the second-floor rooms as his apartment. The first-floor rooms were converted to meet the needs of the Country Club. In 1939 the Country Club added a one story, free standing addition to serve as the men's locker room.

Milton Hershey died on October 13, 1945, just one month after his 88th birthday. High Point continued to serve as the Country Club Clubhouse until 1970 when the Club moved to a new facility on Derry Road. High Point sat vacant until 1977 when it was acquired by Hershey Foods Corporation to serve as a corporate headquarters. Hershey Foods Corporation made extensive renovations to the building to make it functional as an office building, while also placing it on the National Register of Historic Places. The Company used High Point for their executive offices until 1991 when they relocated to a new corporate headquarters located just north of Hershey. Hershey Trust Company has occupied the building since December 1991.

Starting in late October, The Hershey Story Museum is proud to host in-person tours at High Point Mansion several times a week through December. Groups will be limited to ten guests. Face coverings are required. Tickets must be purchased in advance at www.HersheyStory.org or at The Hershey Story Museum.

DO NOT PLACE ASH IN A PLASTIC WASTER CONTAINER. Following these guidelines will help reduce any chance of a fire and loss of life or property.


KYLE CAREY

Penn State Health will host drive-through prescription drug take-back events at three locations from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 24. People may drop off their unwanted, unneeded, or expired medication for safe disposal at the following locations:

- Academic Support Building, 90 Hope Drive, Hershey (on the Hershey Medical Center campus)
- Penn State Health Medical Group—Nyes Road, 121 N. Nyes Road, Harrisburg
- Penn State Health Medical Group—Palmyra, 941 Park Drive, Palmyra

Needles and syringes will also be accepted. The service is free and anonymous with no questions asked. The events aim to provide a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of prescription drugs, while also educating the public about the potential for abuse of medications. These events are being held in partnership with the Derry Township, Lower Paxton Township and North Londonderry Township police departments. They are among several nationwide coordinated by the federal Drug Enforcement Administration. Medications, needles, and syringes cannot be accepted before 10 a.m.
