



CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

The summer of 2022 was a very busy summer for the township team. The Derry Township Community Center officially opened its doors on June 13th. The original target date for completion was Memorial Day weekend 2022. Credit to the project management team for all their hard work to keep this project on time and on budget. The grand opening was pushed back by two weeks to accommodate construction delays, but in light of the supply chain issues and labor shortages caused by the pandemic, opening so close to our original target date was an amazing accomplishment.

The original community center plan provided Zach Jackson and his Parks and Recreation team two months to train staff in the new building, iron out administrative kinks, and resolve punch list items for the contractors. In order to meet

our June 13th opening date, Zach and the team had only two weeks to perform this work. Kudos to Zach and his team for their efforts in getting the center opened and running; twelve- and fourteen-hour days were the norm for many on his team for most of June and July.

Thanks to all our community center members/ residents/Leader Center for Active Life members who demonstrated patience and understanding as we ironed out the kinks of the new facility. Please note we are still ironing out kinks! But we make progress every week. Two items that I want to assure folks we are addressing for next season: more lifeguards and poolside furniture. The lifeguard shortage effected all area pools. We regret that we had to close pools before the end of the season, but our limited roster of lifeguards shrunk considerably when students began leaving for college. We will fix the lifeguard staffing and scheduling problems by, among other things, adding two full-time lifeguards to the part-time lifeguard compliment. Additionally, we are ordering poolside furniture that will arrive before next season begins. The lack of pool furniture at the grand opening was mostly a result of supply chain issues.

We truly appreciate everyone's patience over the summer. We expect more punch-list work to be completed in the coming months and we will keep residents updated on those items in our weekly e-news.

In other matters, the Township Supervisors and the School Board Directors have voted to dissolve the Derry Township Tax Association and use the services of the Dauphin County Treasurer's Office to collect our local real estate taxes beginning in 2023. This move will save the school district and the township, collectively, almost \$400,000 per year. We have asked the county to spend one day per week at the township administration building to continue to collect taxes from those wishing to pay their taxes in person, so long as there is a reasonable demand for that service.

In addition to taxpayer savings, our residents will now be able to pay their real estate taxes online with a credit card or debit card. In addition, the collection of non-real estate local taxes has been put out for bid. We will select that service provider in the next two months and the selected entity will be ready to begin in 2023 as well. While there will be a fee for this service, we expect to collect a higher percentage of delinquent taxes which should help offset the cost of this service.

The decision to dissolve the tax association was the right decision for our community, but we're appreciative of the tax association staff for their many years of service. Lastly, we have been very busy at

the township working to improve township services, reduce unnecessary spending, and reexamining development and traffic in the community. While we see progress on these matters, one area where we really need is with traffic/pedestrian safety. We are receiving more citizen complaints of speeding or aggressive driving than I can ever remember. The township can lower speed limits, add stop signs, and issue traffic tickets—but that won't efficiently solve the problem and improve the safety of our residents. We all must do our part by driving more carefully through our community and setting the example for our young drivers, tourists, and visitors.

The Public Works Department for the Township of Derry is asking for your cooperation.




During street sweeping, leaf picking and snow plowing operations, freestanding basketball nets, soccer goals and any other sporting equipment located along curbs, in alleys, and in the street, pose a serious safety issue to the drivers performing their duties either sweeping, collecting leaves or plowing snow. The Department is asking that this equipment be moved from the roadway and alley so that they do not overhang or protrude into the right-of-way.

RULES FOR CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL

Residents are reminded that Waste Management **WILL NOT** pick up Christmas trees. The Public



Works Department will pick up the trees starting January 3, 2023 and continue until January 27, 2023 – **WEATHER PERMITTING**. The pick up will follow the fall leaf collection schedule. Trees should be placed at **CURBSIDE** – **no pickups will be made in alleys**. As an additional option, any resident may dispose of their Christmas tree at the Township Recycling Center, at no cost, during normal operating hours.


Annual Holiday Train Show

MILTON HERSHEY'S LESSER-KNOWN EARLY VENTURES: THE BIG APPLE

From the Hershey Community Archives

Many know that prior to introducing his wildly popular Hershey's Milk Chocolate, Milton Hershey found his first success in caramels with the Lancaster Caramel Company. However, Lancaster Caramel was far from the first stop in Mr. Hershey's professional ventures – even in the candy industry. This is the fourth and final in a series of articles focusing on the lesser-known early ventures of Milton S. Hershey and how they shaped and influenced his later success.

hen we last left young Milton Hershey, he was traveling the country looking for success in the candy business. He had learned in New Orleans that, in order to start up a business, he would need to have candy-making equipment shipped in from New York City. So, he decided to save on shipping and go right to the source. Perhaps the big city of New York would provide more fruitful opportunities than his previous attempts in Philadelphia, Denver, Chicago, and New Orleans.

When Milton Hershey arrived in New York City in 1883, he was 26 years old and penniless. His first task was to secure employment. He found a job at Huyler, a New York candy manufacturer. While working for Huyler, he got started on his own venture. Paul A.W. Wallace's 1956 manuscript, Milton S. Hershey, discusses this period of Milton's life:

He asked his landlady if she would allow him to use her kitchen range in the evening to make candy, and she said she would. He made candies, wrapped them up, put them on a tray, took them out to the corner, stood under the lamp post, and sold them to passers-by.

After selling caramels on the street, he bought a candy boiler, steam surrounded, hired a room where he could make candy in the evening up to eleven o'clock. A young man who tended the furnace next door let the steam pressure go down before eleven o'clock. Mr. Hershey asked him to keep it up and gave him five dollars. Pretty soon the young fellow wanted five dollars every morning. That was too much for Mr. Hershey, and he moved away.

As we can see, it was tough getting his start in the New York candy market, especially without his own space. Soon Milton took matters into his own hands and opened his very own shop on 6th Avenue.

This was Milton Hershey's second attempt at running his own business. We can only imagine the hopefulness and enthusiasm he felt. He was selling his "fine candies" from a shop with his very own name on the front. His mother (Fanny Snavely) and Aunt Mattie (Martha Snavely) joined him in New York to help with the business in any way they could. His father (Henry Hershey) even joined him for a time to provide his services.

Milton soon found his business growing too large for his shop at 742 5th Avenue. Just like in Philadelphia, people loved his candies, even if the business wasn't the most lucrative. While he still had time left on his lease, he decided to look for a new, larger location.

He found his new headquarters at 441 W. 42nd Street, just a few blocks away. However, he ran into a rather large problem—his previous landlord refused to release him from his lease! Now he was stuck in a tough spot. He was paying rent on two different locations at once and attempting to pay back a large loan for his candy-making equipment. He tried to find a tenant to sublet the 6th Avenue location with no avail. While he struggled through at least another year in New York, this financial blow set him on a downward path.

The final straw came after Milton broke into the cough drop market in New York. One day, he devised a plan to sell the product to small businesses and merchants around town. He rented a horse and wagon, packed the wagon with cough drops, and set out to sell them. While talking to a merchant on one of his stops, some children lit firecrackers under the rented horse. It took off running, scattering the cough drops – his last hope at making a living in New York – in a trail on the street behind the wagon.

After this incident there was no recovery. Penniless yet again, Milton Hershey packed up his candy-making equipment and his few belongings. He somehow gathered enough money for train tickets for himself, Fanny, and Mattie back to Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

Milton Hershey was not necessarily a welcome face in Lancaster when he returned in 1886. Wallace writes:

When Hershey made his start in Lancaster, he had no formal education of any account behind him, and what little advantage his birth had given him in the way of money and social position had long since been dissipated. His father, it was too well known, could neither make nor keep a penny; and Milton's own failures, though never shameful, had so soured his relatives that they regarded him as just another black sheep. No one thought of commending him for what he had done, measuring himself gallantly against giants: Philadelphia, Denver, Chicago, New York.

There was one person, however, who welcomed Milton with open arms: his old friend William Henry "Lebbie" Lebkicher. Lebbie was an old friend from Philadelphia, where the two men worked together at Milton's first candy business.

When Lebbie learned of Milton's predicament, he provided a temporary place to stay not only for his friend, but even for his mother and aunt for a short time. When he learned that Milton had sent all of his candy-making equipment "collect," and now had no money to retrieve it, he paid to have it all released from railroad holding.

Lebbie's kindness and friendship came at a time when Milton needed it the most. He had just failed – again – in New York. His family had lost all hope in him and cut off their financial support. But Milton S. Hershey was not to be deterred. He took one last shot, and started what would become his first successful business, the Lancaster Caramel Company. And the rest, as they say, is history!

2022 LEAF COLLECTION SCHEDULE



Now that we're in the fall season, Public Works Department is preparing for the annual leaf collection. Leaf collection started on Monday, October 3, 2022, and will run through Friday, December 9, 2022.

WE ASK THAT RESIDENTS OBSERVE THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES WHEN PLACING LEAVES AT THE CURB:

- No leaf collection will be made in allevs.
- 2. Do not place any foreign materials, such as rocks, toys, boards, tree trimmings, garden waste, flower stalks, etc. in leaves to be collected. If any such items are present, the leaf pile will not be collected. Foreign material in leaf piles can cause injuries to the workers and can damage the equipment.
- 3. Grass clippings will not be collected. Grass clippings can be taken to the Recycling Center during operating hours.

THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT WILL MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO ADHERE TO THE SCHEDULE SHOWN BELOW. INCLEMENT WEATHER AND THE QUANTITY OF LEAVES WILL DETERMINE WHETHER THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT CAN STAY ON SCHEDULE. WE APPRECIATE YOUR PATIENCE DURING THIS PROGRAM.

PLEASE TRIM TREES TO A HEIGHT OF 12 INCHES ABOVE THE CARTWAY TO ALLOW CLEARANCE FOR LEAF TRUCKS. PLACE BASKETBALL NETS SO THEY DO NOT EXTEND BEYOND THE CURB TO AVOID CONTACT WITH THE LEAF-PICKING EQUIPMENT.



Safety Note

Fall also produces leaves, lots of leaves and with that comes an increased risk of fire from the hot exhausts of cars. Be aware of where you park. Don't park over leaf piles or places your collected leaves near an open ignition source.

This is also a great time to prepare for the colder months that are just around the corner. Make an appointment to have your fireplace and chimney serviced so when winter comes a knocking, you'll be all ready to safely enjoy the warmth and comfort of your fireplace.

I would also like to stress the importance of proper disposal of hot coals or fireplace ash. Leftover ash can remain hot for hours and even days after discarded. Please remember when you are emptying your fireplace firebox or your outside fire ring all remaining ash needs to be soaked with water and placed in a covered




metal container away from your house, garage or any combustible material such as yard waste. DO NOT PLACE ASH IN A PLASTIC WASTER CONTAINER. Following these guidelines will help reduce any chance of a fire and loss of life or property.

Hershey Volunteer Fire Department Improves ISO Rating for Derry and Conewago Township

Every 5–10 years, the Insurance Services Office (ISO) collects and evaluates communities on their structure fire suppression capabilities. The score from this evaluation can be used by insurance companies to determine fire risk insurance rates (each company uses the information differently). The better the Public Protection Classification (PPC), means lower fire losses.

There are numerous areas that the department and Township are scored in to achieve this level of ranking. It is a cumulative effort on the part of our dedicated volunteers who protect the residents and visitors to Derry Township and Derry Township's support of the volunteers that make this possible.



Business owners and residential customers are encouraged to contact their insurance carriers and ask about this new ISO rating for Derry Township. It could save you some money.

Hershey Fire Department Orders New Fire Engine

We would like to extend our sincere thanks to the Derry Township Board of Supervisors for approving the purchase of a 2024 Pierce Enforcer Pumper to Glick Fire Equipment located in Lancaster County. Our committee worked tirelessly to

develop a specification that will best serve the community, our department and firefighter for generations to come. Some of the highlights that this engine will have include a 1,500 gallon per minute pump. It will carry 750 gallons of water and 20 gallons foam, various hose line configurations, ground ladders along with state-of-the-art, battery operated auto extrication rescue tools and various hand-tools to support the mission of the department.

We thank the Derry Township Board of Supervisors and the residents for their continued support. As a volunteer agency we could not supply the level of service without everyone's support and generosity.






